Review: last year's aims and outcomes

Aim	Outcome
Additional staffing and resourcing to implement extra tuition for phonics and reading.	No data is available due to COVID-19.
Overall attendance of disadvantaged pupils will increase.	In the period up to when COVID-19 lockdown commenced, attendance for disadvantaged pupils was down 4.19% on the same period within the academic year 2018/19. Although half of our disadvantaged children improved their overall attendance.
Children will demonstrate more resilience and happiness – measured through pupil talk and questionnaires.	This outcome for this objective wasn't able to be measured before restrictions we imposed for COVID-19.
